Q1	Kudos to Bursa for improving Bursa Anywhere app to what it is today. 03/03/26 12:27:54 PM My next wish for improvement is for the IPO process to speed up much faster than the current practice. In overseas markets, the process from application to listing takes days. Over here, it takes weeks. Can Bursa look into streamlining the process?	The period between IPO application to listing date involves multiple stakeholders’ processes, including the Issuing House, Share Registrar, Placement Agent, Bookrunners, Underwriter, Advisers etc. All IPO applications will go through respective due process hence, it is time consuming. We are aware of this and are considering several options for greater efficiency of the listing process, i.e. shortening the time taken for processing or centralised the application processes.
Q2	Operating revenue declined by 7.4% and PATAMI dropped by 19.3%, yet operating expenses increased by 4.5%, driving the cost-to-income ratio up significantly to 53.7% from 47.7% in the previous year. What specific cost rationalization measures is the Board implementing to realign expense growth with revenue generation in the upcoming financial year?	<p>The increase in the cost-to-income ratio reflects revenue compression alongside continued investment in long-term growth. In response, Bursa is focused on improving operational efficiency through digitalisation, strengthening cost discipline, and optimising resource allocation towards higher-impact areas to progressively improve cost efficiency in the coming year. Bursa is actively looking at targeted area in its cost monitoring and discipline measures:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cost discipline measures across discretionary spending • Digitalisation and automation in certain area of back-office • Prioritisation of high impact investments while deferring non-critical projects • Ongoing assessment of cost structures.
Q3	The derivatives market achieved a record high of 23.3 million contracts traded and a record average daily contract (ADC) volume. However, trading revenue for derivatives declined marginally by 0.9% to RM112.8 million, attributed to lower collateral management fees. How does management plan to optimize the monetization of this record trading volume moving forward to ensure volume growth translates to top-line growth?	<p>Although derivatives trading volume reached record levels, much of this activity reflects short-term trading with holding periods of around two weeks or less, resulting in lower margin utilisation and consequently lower collateral management fees.</p> <p>To enhance monetisation, we are expanding our product suite and market ecosystem to diversify revenue sources and attract a broader participant base. We are also strengthening engagement with institutional and commercial users, which typically generate higher and more stable margin utilisation.</p> <p>At the same time, we are broadening retail participation through products such as the Mini FBM KLCI (FKLM), which lowers entry barriers and encourages hedging activity. These initiatives collectively aim to ensure that volume growth increasingly translates into sustainable top-line improvement.</p>

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Q4	<p>The Securities Market saw a 19.2% decline in Average Daily Trading Value (ADV-OMT) to RM2.55 billion. Given the strategic target to achieve RM28.0 billion in IPO market capitalization in 2026, what specific strategies are being deployed to stimulate retail and institutional trading velocity to ensure adequate liquidity for these anticipated new listings?</p>	<p>To support liquidity, Bursa implements market making arrangements and a Securities Borrowing and Lending (SBL) framework, providing continuous trading depth for IPO stocks while facilitating hedging and smoother trading activity. Collectively, these measures strengthen investor confidence and participation in new listings.</p> <p>In addition, Bursa RISE+ provides annual research coverage on selected PLCs, including private and pre IPO companies. For private and pre IPO companies, this facilitates earlier investor assessment and ensures continued research coverage post listing. All research reports are publicly available via the MyBURSA portal.</p> <p>At the engagement level, the Bursa IR4U Programme strengthens investor relations, enhances issuer–investor collaboration, and supports informed market participation.</p> <p>These efforts are complemented by the Invest Malaysia series, Institutional Sectoral Series and Retail Corporate Day, which provide structured investor access and targeted corporate engagements to support sustainable market liquidity.</p>
Q5	<p>Non-trading revenue grew by 5.0% to RM256.6 million, but the stated strategic target for 2026 is an ambitious growth rate of >10%. What are the primary drivers, specific inorganic growth opportunities, or new data/digital service offerings expected to double this growth rate in a potentially volatile economic environment?</p>	<p>In 2026, a key priority for Bursa is to accelerate growth via Data and Digital Services, which is core to growing our non-trading revenue (NTR). We will continue to scale our data business beyond traditional market data into newer domains. The CSI Solution, designed to facilitate corporates’ ISSB reporting requirements, continues to be in the forefront as a new growth lever. In addition to that, we are also building a marketplace that offers sustainability tools and solutions and further proof of concepts for monetisation of proprietary datasets using artificial intelligence (AI).</p> <p>Additionally, the revision of listing-related fees and regulatory-related fees which took effect from 1 January 2026 will drive higher revenue from listing and issuer services. Please refer to the Company’s announcements dated 17 October 2025 and 30 October 2025 regarding the revised fees charged by Bursa.</p>

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Q6	<p>The Board is proposing a 50% increase in the Fixed Board Committee Allowance (e.g., from RM1,000 to RM1,500 per month for members), contributing to the higher RM2.6 million benefits cap sought under Resolution 5. How does the Board justify this substantial percentage increase in committee allowances during a financial year where PATAMI declined by 19.3% and ROE contracted?</p>	<p>In October 2025, the Nomination and Remuneration Committee (NRC) had conducted a review of the Board Remuneration. In this review, the NRC considered all relevant factors including the Company’s financial position, its long term-sustainability as well as the benchmark study on Directors’ remuneration at comparable companies and other exchanges.</p> <p>Having considered the outcome of the Board Remuneration review, the Board decided that the proposed increase in the Fixed Board Committee Allowance is justifiable based on these factors:-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The current Fixed Board Committee Allowance (except the Regulatory & Conflicts Committee) has remained the same in the last 8 years, since April 2018. • Bursa offers among the lowest Board Committee Allowance in the market, lagging behind the Company’s key comparators. Hence, there is a need to reflect comparable remuneration in the industry. • While the proposed percentage increase appears significant, it is from a low base (i.e. RM1,000 per month for a Committee Member, and RM1,667 per month for a Committee Chairman). The Fixed Board Committee Allowance remains below market median even after this increase. • The increase is reasonable given the increased responsibilities with the expanded job scope of the Board Committees and hence, more commitments required of the Committee Members. <p>The increase is necessary to support effective Board oversight and the continued ability to attract and retain suitably qualified independent directors, in the best interests of Bursa Group.</p>
Q7	<p>The Exchange experienced a significant market disruption lasting 8 hours and 43 minutes due to an emergency cooling issue at the CME Group data center. What specific redundancies, failover mechanisms, or revised Service Level Agreements (SLAs) are being instituted to prevent reliance on a single third-party facility from causing such extensive market downtime in the future?</p>	<p>The disruption was caused by a technical issue involving the cooling system at the CME data centre, which affected the Globex platform. This was an isolated incident and the first of its kind since 2009.</p> <p>Following the event, we conducted an internal review with a focus on strengthening our contingency processes and operational response. We are also in ongoing discussions</p>

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		<p>with CME, who have since enhanced their monitoring mechanisms to reduce the likelihood of recurrence.</p> <p>Our existing Service Level Agreement (SLA) with CME outlines performance expectations and responsibilities in the event of system-related disruptions. Noting that the previous CME halt resulted in disruption to Derivatives Market operations, and considering CME’s global market access and connectivity, we are adopting a coordinated, group-wide approach to ensure risks continue to be appropriately managed while supporting the long-term growth of the derivatives business.</p>
Q8	Despite the company's commitment to SBTi targets, Scope 3 emissions increased by nearly 15% to 7,177 tCO ₂ e, primarily driven by Purchased Goods and Services. What targeted interventions and strict procurement criteria are being applied to the supply chain to reverse this upward trend and align with the 2030 absolute reduction targets?	Bursa is currently formulating a Net Zero Roadmap that encompasses strategies and initiatives that the Exchange would undertake to meet its GHG emissions reduction targets over time. For Scope 3 emissions, our immediate priority is to onboard suppliers/vendors onto the CSI Solution platform to collect their emissions data – this will facilitate subsequent engagements to effect decarbonisation. We will report on progress in future reporting cycles.

The broader market ecosystem relies on the coordinated operations of both the capital markets (Bursa) and the financial markets (Bank Negara Malaysia (BNM)), including our respective infrastructures. When BNM infrastructure such as RENTAS is available which was the case for 3 Feb 2026 incident, Bursa will also open for trading, clearing and settlement.</p> <p>2. Total revenue for the extra working days was recorded at RM1,900,000 while the incremental cost (i.e. overtime, utilities such as electricity) was estimated at RM731, 000, which bring us to a net income before tax of RM1,169,000.</p> <p>Bursa’s decision to operate is guided by its responsibility to ensure market continuity in keeping the market accessible and avoiding unnecessary disruption to settlement and market operations.</p>
Q18	In view of global energy challenges and government efforts to reduce fuel consumption, could Securities Commission Malaysia and Bursa Malaysia persuade listed companies to adopt hybrid AGMs, especially during peak AGM season, to reduce travel, support sustainability, and improve shareholder inclusivity?	<p>Presently, the Listing Requirements allow listed companies the flexibility to hold their general meetings either fully in-person or in a hybrid manner, based on their circumstances, including shareholder demographics.</p> <p>We take note of your feedback and will continue to work with key stakeholders, including the Securities Commission Malaysia (SC), to explore measures to support quality shareholder engagement and promote better sustainability practices.</p>

Will it be necessary to revise Bursa 2026 headline KPI of situation persists?	1. Thus far, the impact remains largely contained. We have not seen signs of disorderly or sustained capital outflows. Since the war started, we have experienced a relatively mild outflow of RM368.4 million (up to 24 March), reducing the YTD inflow to RM851.4 million. This is mild compared to regional peers. Malaysia continues to benefit from its relative positioning - commodity exposure, defensive sector mix, and domestic institutional support. At the same time, global investors continue to reassess their allocations, with

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		<p>increasing focus on diversification; this provides supportive flows to markets like Malaysia.</p> <p>2. As the global landscape continues to shift, we do not want to view this through the lens of binary outcomes. A short-term threat could become an opening for long-term opportunities. As for the ongoing war, we see this primarily as a near-term volatility event — market functioning and liquidity conditions remain orderly. As seen from market price movements, there are selective opportunities for investors in our marketplace. Over the medium term, Bursa remains focused on fundamentals — market development, listings pipeline, and investor participation, which are not altered by short-term geopolitical events.</p> <p>3. Bursa recognises that the uncertainties in macroeconomic environment due to the heightened geopolitical tensions can affect investor sentiment and/or create global market volatility. At this juncture, we do not believe a revision to the 2026 Headline KPI targets is warranted. As with past practice, we will continue to actively monitor market conditions. Should there be a material and sustained shift in market dynamics, Bursa will evaluate the need to refine our 2026 Headline KPI target(s), which would then be communicated accordingly.</p>

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	<p>and if it does happen again what is the contingency plan</p> <p>b) on this same topics of cybersecurity, how does bursa ensure the market integrity and Bursa's system integrity in view of these issues at certain trading platforms</p>	<p>There was no disruption to Bursa’s infrastructure, trading platform or market operations, which continued normally and there was no evidence of unauthorised trading or financial loss.</p> <p>The affected brokers acted swiftly to contain the incident by immediately isolating and applying internal incident-response controls.</p> <p>The immediate measures taken by Bursa were as follows:-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Activation of its cybersecurity response protocols, working closely with affected brokers • Directed all brokers and selected vendors to perform comprehensive system screening, issued advisories, and conducted briefings to reinforce cybersecurity vigilance. <p>Industry-wide measures introduced earlier to enhance cyber resilience remain in effect, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Multi Factor Authentication (MFA) enforcement across major connection points to the Exchange. • Segregation procedures for any compromised systems or connections. • Heightened surveillance to detect suspicious activity early. • Improved incident-handling and escalation protocols. <p>The above measures improved industry preparedness and enabled coordinated and timely incident containment.</p> <p>Bursa is also conducting a holistic review of its IT Security Standards for brokers to fortify industry-wide cyber defences, including stronger oversight of information service vendors and better protection of critical systems. The revised ITSS framework is expected to be rolled out in Q4 2026.</p>
<p>Q25</p>	<p>Why the Bursa Malaysia did not compulsory the listed company to send the notice of AGM/EGM to shareholders via registered e-mail in addition to the announcement made via Bursa Malaysia?</p>	<p>Presently, notices of general meetings must be announced to the Exchange and published by way of advertisement in at least one nationally circulated Bahasa Malaysia or English daily newspaper.</p>

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		<p>In addition, a listed issuer may circulate notices of general meetings electronically to shareholders, subject to the provisions of the listed issuer’s constitution. Hence, a listed issuer may send its notice of AGM/EGM to shareholders via their registered e-mail if it is allowed to do so under its Constitution. However, we are unable to mandate all listed issuers to do so as not all shareholders have registered their email address in the Record of Depositors maintained by the Central Depository.</p> <p>The current framework ensures shareholders are informed of AGMs and EGMs while allowing a listed issuer the discretion to adopt multiple channels available to engage and communicate with its shareholders effectively.</p>

Kindly improve this process or regulate the platform.</p>	<p>We wish to clarify that Bursa does not regulate or prescribe the specific registration or virtual meeting platform (“online platform”) used by listed issuers. Such online platforms are provided by third-party service providers engaged by the listed issuers (similar to the appointment of external auditors and other professional advisers). The focus of the regulatory framework under the Listing Requirements is to promote effective shareholder participation in general meetings and facilitate meaningful engagement between shareholders, the board and senior management, regardless of the mode of meeting. Specifically, the Listing Requirements outlined additional requirements relating to shareholder participations if the listed issuer conducts a hybrid general meeting.</p> <p>Accordingly, listed issuers may appoint or change service providers from time to time, taking into account factors such as operational needs, technological capabilities, shareholder or user experience and cost considerations. Service providers engaged are expected to meet the necessary standards to support listed issuers in complying with the Listing Requirements.</p>

What is the thinking and rationale behind this change?	<p>The adoption of Return On Equity (ROE) as a headline financial KPI demonstrates Bursa’s focus to deliver sustainable returns and capital efficiency, as compared to just profit amount as a standalone measure.</p> <p>In our recent engagements with institutional investors, we understand that ROE is a key financial metric monitored on listed stocks. We have made this change to help support comparability against peers by investors.</p> <p>Furthermore, we note that listed peer exchanges (e.g. Australian Securities Exchange (ASX) and Japan Exchange Group (JPX)) similarly disclose ROE as a key performance measure to demonstrate financial discipline and long-term value creation.</p> <p>ROE is a measure that indicates how efficient a company in generating profit over its equity which would be a more meaningful indicator for stakeholders in assessing Bursa’s overall performance.</p>

Enhancements made included the Regulatory and Conflicts Committee (RACC)’s membership composition, functions and governance structure, such as enhancing the independence of RACC vis a vis the management of Bursa. In particular, it was noted that the RACC now consists majority external members including the chairman of the RACC; b) In light of the above enhancements undertaken by Bursa thus far, the SC viewed that there was no necessity to proceed with the proposed legislation currently and would continue to monitor and assess the effectiveness of the current governance structure; and c) The SC took the position that the current, progressively strengthened RACC structure is adequate and practical towards the effective discharge of Bursa’s regulatory functions.
